As we all know this invites conversation and places importance on learning; surely a good thing! Interestingly, studies have found students believe their parents are more interested in their grades than being a caring community member. Perhaps together we can shift this perception for our students. What if we asked questions that placed an emphasis on kindness, empathy, and compassion? Questions such as "Who did you help today?" "Did you witness any acts of kindness or compassion today?" "Have you noticed someone who may need some support?" "Did you hear any kind words or gestures by anyone?" If we begin to shift the conversations and questions to incorporate thoughts and behaviors connected to kindness, empathy, and compassion we are more likely to convey the message that these attributes matter as much as academic growth. Further, research supports that when people feel a stronger sense of community their physical health is improved and their overall growth, including academic achievement, is enhanced. Collectively, we can aim to enrich every student's educational experience alongside promoting the importance of being caring community members.


